Civil War Newspaper

Directions: You and your three classmates are journalists covering the Civil War for the North or South. You and your team must create a newspaper in order to inform citizens of the Union or Confederacy about what exactly is going on in the war. Since this is a newspaper, the format must be that of a newspaper (e.g., op-ed, obituary, advertisement, articles, etc.). Remember to use the framework and guiding questions you have learned about from previous lessons on how to write a good article and creating a political cartoon.

You and your team must incorporate or address the following in your newspaper:

- Create a title for your newspaper. Identify whether or not your newspaper will be written in the perspective of the Union or Confederacy.
- Decide which two battles you would like to write about.
- Write a story informing civilians of a technological change that took place during the Civil War.
 - o Medicine, war tactics, photography, nutrition, naval warfare, weapons, etc.
- Write an interview piece on an individual involved with the war.
 - o Elected official, general, spy, soldier, etc.
- Political cartoon
- At least three primary sources (speech, letter, a photo, a quote, etc.)
- Obituary
- Advertisement

Remember that this is a group project; everyone needs to equally contribute to the newspaper. For each story or image that is placed on your newspaper, be sure to write your name. Doing so, will let me know what you exactly did. This is your opportunity to show your class and I what you've learned on the Civil War.

Various primary sources are embedded throughout the newspaper. These primary sources are not only integrated in the newspaper, but are explained.
