
Nullification & Secession



Alien & Sedition Acts


- Naturalization Act: required immigrants to be residents for 14 years instead of 5 years before they became eligible for citizenship
- Alien Act: Allowed the president to imprison immigrants or send those he considered dangerous out of the country
- Sedition Act: Make it a crime to speak, write, or publish "false, scandalous, and malicious" criticisms of the government.

1798: Alien & Sedition Acts are Passed

- Why they were passed:
 - Strengthen the federal government
 - Silence Republican opposition
- Results:
 - Discouraged immigration
 - Some immigrants would leave the country
 - Convicted Republican newspaper editors
- Reactions:
 - Opposition to the Federalist Party grows
 - Led movement to allow states to overturn federal laws

Outcome: Virginia & Kentucky Resolution
